Report:

Skill development 2021 in Mathematics was organized by, Desalites Skill Development Cell in association with Math π Rates club, Department of Science on "Basic skills in Mathematics" on 29th January 2021 at 1 P.M. Assistant Prof. Roshini from department of Science was the resource person. The session was conducted online using Google meet platform. The program was conducted for first year students of B.Sc (MEC, PCM and CJP).

Mathematics is the cradle of all creations, without which the world cannot move an inch. The ever changing needs of the society, and the high availability and demand for gadgets such as computers and calculators require that students be a master of basic math skills. Apart from the very basic of all math skills, the add-subtract- multiply-divide skills, there are other areas of math skills every student should learn.

The main aim of this program was to make students understand the importance of developing basic Mathematical skills, as Mathematical aptitude and logical reasoning are becoming integral part of any recruitment process. Knowledge of mathematics, and its complexities, can help in almost every career. Therefore an absence of mathematical confidence and poor mathematical skills are obstructions to employment, improved Mathematical skills lead to better paid jobs, greater well-being and a less stressful life.

The only way to learn Mathematics is to do Mathematics, students were given certain tips on how to be successful in math class and to how to overcome math anxiety. Some points on how to improve Mathematical skills like, focusing on understanding concepts, concentrating more over new concepts and practicing more problems, solving extra problems, understanding word problems, applying Math to real life, playing Math games and solving puzzles were discussed. In order to improve mathematical skills students should have a strong foundation with the basic concepts, keeping this in mind, all the important basic concepts of mathematics like different types of numbers, sign rules, law of indices, Bodmas rule, finding HCF and LCM of given numbers, fractions,basic operations on fractions, linear equations, Simultaneous equations, methods to solve simultaneous equations by substitution and elimination method were explained. Along with these few problems related to aptitude were discussed and solved. It was an interactive session, most of them were able to recall the basic concepts that they had studied in the lower classes.

As students have lot of confusion with addition and subtraction of integers with different signs the concept was explained by solving different types of problems. Apart from these students were also explained the important Mathematical skills that they should develop like

Problem solving: This is a basic skill that each student should learn as it enables them to develop analytical thinking.

Applied Math: This is something every student should learn - applying math in everyday situations. Every day we are presented with different math situations and students should be able to handle those with confidence.

Estimation and approximation: this skill will be used almost every day. Measurements are everywhere and whatever we are buying will be estimated and approximated.

Computational skills: This is by far among the very important basic math skills one should be able to learn and understand. Everyday situations require us to be knowledgeable in computations of whole numbers or fractions, decimals and this should be done without any calculator. Basic mental computation is a must to solve daily computational problems without any hassle.

They were also explained about the advantages of developing Mathematical skills, battling successfully with ideas that are hard to understand and problems that are hard to solve will foster determination, perseverance, creativity, self-confidence, intellectual rigor and time management. Students were also given an idea about higher education in mathematics and the different career opportunities that they could get after pursuing a degree in mathematics. The mathematics major prepares students for traditional pursuits such as graduate study, teaching and work as an actuary. Students who major in mathematics have a variety of opportunities like Actuarial science, data science, Information technology and computing, business, management, consulting, teaching at the elementary or secondary school level, graduate study in mathematics or statistics, especially for an academic career, graduate study in applied mathematics or statistics, for a career in industry, business or government, graduate study in an interdisciplinary field related to the mathematical and statistical sciences. In the past half century there has been a great increase in the importance of mathematics to our society. The need for trained mathematicians at all levels is on the rise as the use of computers and automation has spread to almost all sectors of our economy. Nowadays, technological, engineering and business problems are often of such complexity that they require a high level of mathematical treatment. Whereas in the past advanced mathematics was generally restricted to the physical sciences and engineering, today there is an ever growing demand for mathematical expertise in the biological and social sciences, as well as in finance and business management and the burgeoning field of data science.

The session was conducted for one hour. Students got an idea about the importance of developing mathematical skills in today's competitive and challenging world. Students had several doubts which were clarified during the question-answer session. At the end of the session participants were given link for feedback .The feedback form had few quiz questions related to basic math, and few questions about the session. Quiz was given in order to assess what students understood from the session and also to improve their problem solving skills. Almost everyone gave correct answers to the quiz questions, they also gave a positive feedback about the session.





Hence, it has constituted a special skill development cell- The Desalites Skill Development Cell that works relentlessly to enhance the employability skills of the students so that after completing their formal education, the students can face the challenges of the global competitive job market with confidence.

The Desalites Skill Development Cell in association with the Chaucer's Academy organised a skill development programme on ICT titled, “Improving Memory Using ICT” for the III Semester BCA/BBA/BCOM students on 27 January 2021. The programme was conducted via Google Meet from 1pm to 2pm. The objective of this skill development programme was to impart reliability by improving cognizance with supportive technology. The resource person of the programme was Dr. Sheeba, HoD, Department of English, SFS College.

The resource person started the session by quoting Aneta Cruz, “Your mind is your greatest

power, use it well." She emphasised on the importance of sharp memory and the power of human brain. Next, she went on to describe the types of memory. After that, the resource person discussed the memory improvement techniques in detail. She said that in order to sharpen our memory it is important to challenge the brain and one can challenge the brain in a number of ways like learning a new skill or a new language, playing brain games, socializing, joining online games and hanging up with positive people. Dr. Sheeba also mentioned some of the important brain-boosting activities like swimming, cycling, aerobics, laughter, pleasant conversation, mediation, and yoga etc.

In order to make the students understand the concept many practical examples were given based on Accounting and its rules.

Excel is to computer programs what a Ferrari is to cars: sleek on the outside and a lot of

power under the hood. Excel is also like a truck. It can handle all your data — lots of it. In fact, in Excel 2019, a single worksheet has 17,179,869,184 places to hold data. Yes, that's what I said — more than 17 billion data placeholders. And that's on just *one* worksheet! Opening files created in earlier versions of Excel may show just the number of worksheet rows and columns available in the version the workbook was created with.

Excel is used in all types of businesses. And you know how that's possible? By being able to store and work with any kind of data. It doesn't matter whether you're in finance or sales, whether you run an online e-commerce store or organize wilderness trips, or whether you're charting party RSVPs or tracking the scores of your favourite sports teams — Excel can handle all of it. Its number-crunching ability is just awesome! And so easy to use!

Just putting a bunch of information on worksheets doesn't crunch the data or give you sums, results, or analyses. If you want to just store your data somewhere, you can use Excel or get a database program instead. In this book, I show you how to build formulas and how to use the dozens of built-in functions that Excel provides. That's where the real power of Excel is — making sense of your data. Don't fret that this is a challenge and that you may make mistakes. I did when I was ramping up. Besides, Excel is very forgiving. It won't crash on you. Excel usually tells you when you made a mistake, and sometimes it even helps you correct it. How many programs do that? But first, the basics. This first chapter gives you


the springboard you need to use the rest of the book. I wish books like this were around when I was introduced to computers. I had to stumble through a lot of this.

In Excel, a *workbook* is the same as a file. Excel opens and closes workbooks, just as a word processor program opens and closes documents. When you start up Excel, you are presented with a selection of templates to use, the first one being the standard blank workbook. Also there is a selection of recent files to select from. After you open a new or already created workbook, click the File tab to view basic functions such as opening, saving, printing, and closing your Excel files (not to mention a number of other nifty functions to boot!). 


REPORT OF THE EVENT:

PPT is a file extension for a presentation file format used by Microsoft PowerPoint, the popular presentation software commonly used for office and educational slide shows. All text images, sound and video used in the presentation are contained in the PPT file. PPT files can be viewed by PowerPoint, PowerPoint Viewer or the Open Office software suite.

PowerPoint is best used when students are expected to retain complex graphics, animation, and figures. For alphanumeric information (e.g., text and numbers) PowerPoint as well as traditional presentations can be used. If students are expected to retain information and/or concepts that are best conveyed through dialog or verbal explanation, traditional presentations appear to be best. This type of information should not be shared verbally in the presence of PowerPoint, because people tend to focus on that what is presented on the slides as opposed to what is verbalized. If students are expected to retain simple graphs and alphanumeric information that is verbalized and displayed visually, either presentation style is acceptable. Overall, this study explains the "intelligent use" of PowerPoint – when to use or not use. Educational technologies are most effective when used properly

Every year 10th of January is celebrated as World Laughter Day from 10.30 a.m to 11.30 a.m. Laughter and therapeutic laughter plays a major role in the field of Psychology. Dept. of Psychology, Postgraduate Centre planned to organize training program for MSc. Psychology students on laughter therapy. PsyLight Club of Dept. of Psychology, Postgraduate Centre focuses on building strengths of students and prepares them for the competitive world. The curriculum is well planned catering to the basic knowledge required for students to start their career. The department plans regularly to add to the knowledge and experience of students. Relevant and appropriate topics are considered to enrich knowledge of students in the field of Applied Psychology. PsyLight Club arranged for training session on Laughter Therapy. 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




The procedure of the activity


- ✓ The activity was based on a virtual learning experience for students to learn Virtual Trading of Share Market.


7. Social Media: A boon or a bane for society and individuals

- Social Media is a cost-effective marketing and branding tool. It has created a paradigm shift in the way brands advertise and market products.

- While on the surface it appears social networking brings people together across the Internet, in a larger sense it may create social isolation.



- While many businesses use social networking sites to find and communicate with clients, the sites also prove a great distraction to employees who may show more interest in what their friends are posting than in their work tasks.

Adding details to both their characters and their stories is something many kids need to work on. In this game, though, the most important thing is quick thinking, not creating a logical story, which can make for some pretty ridiculous tales!

Goal of Activity: Students will participate in developing an adventure story, using the cue words "fortunately" and "unfortunately" to indicate a change in the plot.

Skills Targeted: Storytelling, verbal communication, written communication, vocabulary, analytical thinking skills.

This classic game was popularised in 80s. It is fun to play and helps to generate a lot of positives and negatives for a given topic. Delegates go through a series of statements that start with 'fortunately' or 'unfortunately' while alternating between them.

The beauty of this exercise is that positive and negative statements are always balanced against each other; you can never say too many good things or bad things about a topic and hence it encourages participants to focus on improving it or creating a balanced narrative..

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
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This activity could be considered as a platform for promoting the concept of online activity for gaining knowledge among students. It was learning with activity which was useful to students in enhancing their knowledge.


The outcome of the Session:



The firm began with 20 employees offering IT and BPO services across various sectors. The initial success of the company soon led to it getting listed and opting for an IPO in the BSE in 1991. Post this the company soon got its first Fortune 500 client- Deere and Co. This further allowed the business to grow rapidly into becoming one of the top players in the market.

Satyam soon became the fourth largest IT software exporter in the industry after TCS, Wipro, and Infosys.

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

The objective of the study is to make students aware about "The Great Recession was a period of marked general decline observed in national economies globally that occurred between 2007 and 2009". The scale and timing of the recession varied from country to country.

INTRODUCTION

The Great Recession refers to the economic downturn from 2007 to 2009 after the bursting of the U.S. housing bubble and the global financial crisis.

- A recession is a decline or stagnation in economic growth, but the economic indicators used to define the term "recession" have changed over time. The Great Recession started in December 2007. From that time, until the event's end, GDP declined by 4.3 percent, and the unemployment rate approached 10 percent.
- The Great Recession refers to the economic downturn from 2007 to 2009 after the bursting of the U.S. housing bubble and the global financial crisis.

CAUSES

The Great Recession was the most severe economic recession in the United States since the Great Depression of the 1930s. The Great Recession—sometimes referred to as the 2008 Recession—in the United States and Western Europe has been linked to the so-called "subprime mortgage crisis."

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- Subprime mortgages are home loans granted to borrowers with poor credit histories. Their home loans are considered high-risk loans.
- With the housing boom in the United States in the early to mid-2000s, mortgage lenders seeking to capitalize on rising home prices were less restrictive in terms of the types of borrowers they approved for loans. And as housing prices continued to rise in North America and Western Europe, other financial institutions acquired thousands of these risky mortgages in bulk (typically in the form of mortgage-backed securities) as an investment, in hopes of a quick profit.

REASONS TO SELECT THIS TOPIC FOR ACTIVITY:

Procedure of the activity



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The session titled, Stress Management among students is aimed at achieving the following objectives.

- Definition
- Signs of stress and common symptoms of stress
- What are the common causes of stress among students?
- CBT
- Strategies – ABC Strategy
- Techniques and coping strategies
- Self-Care Plan

The session began with the breathing exercise animated by the presenter. Then he invited the participants to write the definition of what stress means to each one by way of which he probed to the question to elicit personal reflection. The definitions of stress and

stress management were presented to understand the concepts. Some definitions were like "the non-specific response of the body to any demand for change." "A state of mental tension and worry caused by problems in your life, work, etc". "Something that causes strong feelings of worry or anxiety". "Stress results from an imbalance between demands and resources."

Stress Management is defined as the amelioration of stress and especially chronic stress often the purpose of improving everyday functioning. Followed by the definitions of stress and stress management, the physical, emotional and behavioral signs of stress were highlighted. Later on the participants were asked to recall an event whereby they experienced physical, emotional, and behavioral signs of stress and they were asked to identify and note down their reaction what they do when they are in stress.

Having identified the signs of stress, the animator presented the common stressors or common causes of stress especially among students or among adolescents. Various psychological, emotional and social causes of stress are experienced by the students or adolescents during their stage of formation. A point was emphasized on the characteristics and the psychological nature of the adolescents and the causes were identified based on their characteristics. The participants were invited to identify causes of stress experienced by them. Through this session, the students were enabled to become more aware of their psychological nature and the critical stages of life that cause stress.

Through analyze of Cognitive Behavioral therapy, the participants were enabled to be aware of how thoughts affect our behavior and emotion. As a result, the presenter highlighted the unhelpful patterns of thinking that affect the behavior of adolescents that include: All or Nothing Thinking, Overgeneralization, Jumping to Conclusions, Filtering out the Positive, Emotional Reasoning, Catastrophizing, Should Statements, and Personalization.

The second major part of the session was on the way to manage stress. In this section, the presenter gave the mental, relaxation and stress management techniques. More precisely, through Cognitive Therapy, the ABC strategy was introduced to the participants as a way of managing stress. Awareness, Balance and Control are known as ABC strategy

by which the presenter developed the techniques to control and manage stress. He also introduce the method of re-framing and positive thinking and assertive training as a way to manage stress. Finally, a self-care plan was introduced to the participants through 10 de-stressing techniques are:

- 1-Be active
- 2- Take control
- 3-Connect with people
- 4- Have a special time
5. Challenge yourself
- 6- Avoid unhealthy habits
- 7- Participate in volunteer work
8. Work smart, not stress
- 9-Be positive
10. Accept the things that you cannot change

Finally, the presenter concluded by saying that the best way to live stress free life or manage stress is through positive thinking and deletion of unhelpful patterns of thinking and replace them with self-affirmative and positive thinking.

The resource person for the above program was Dr. Reva Prasad (HOD, Hindi Department, St. Francis De Sales College). The mentors of various departments conducted the same on the G-suit platform, through a recorded voice-over power point presentation.

The presentation started off with a brief introduction to the topic. It included a story named 'Path ki Baadha' which involved the story of a king who wanted to test whether the citizens of his kingdom were selfish or self-less. The story focused on the underlying feeling of self-confidence that allows one to be self-less and conscious of other beings. The introduction also included an inspiring example of Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam and his great accomplishments, relating the same to the story narrated initially. The presentation went on to name other accomplished humans such as Michael Jordon and Mother Teresa. Some of their quotes and services were discussed.

The next story narrated by the resource person was, 'Makkhan Ka Vazan'. It was about a poor farmer and a well-to-do shopkeeper who went to court over an issue around 'makkhan ka vazan'. The farmer wins the case due to his self-confidence and responsible behavior. The same was related to a famous quote by Ralph Waldo Emerson about failing due to internal fears. It was given a natural example about how the honey bee collects honey bit by bit and makes an entire honey comb by doing the same, over and over again. Other references were from the ancient science of yoga and meditation, which were backed up by examples of Mahatma Buddha and Mahaveer.

A video involving the story of farmers was played to show the self-reliant ability of people with self-confidence. The students were told that mistakes are not to put oneself in a shell and stop exploring, but to learn by trial and error and keep going. Supporting women to achieve great achievements, the examples of Kalpana Chawla, Sunita Williams and Arunima Sinha were shared. The presentation was concluded by sharing another story and a few tips to maintain ones self-confidence and never give up.




OBJECTIVE-

Question posed for TPS:


You want to change the world. Who do you think should change, you or the society?



This is because gratitude is an inherent quality that resides within each human being, and is triggered and expressed spontaneously in a variety of different contexts. Gratitude crosses all boundaries— creed, age, vocation, gender, and nation—and is emphasized by all the great religious traditions. Gratitude is essentially the recognition of the unearned increments of value in one’s experience—the acknowledgment of the positive things that come our way that we did not actively work toward or ask for. The International Encyclopedia of Ethics defines gratitude as “the heart’s internal indicator on which the tally of gifts outweighs exchanges,” a definition that echoes the notion of unearned increments. The connection to the concept of gifts is a natural one.

Desalites Skill Development Cell in association with PsyLight Club, Dept. of Psychology, Postgraduate Centre, SFS College organized Life Skill Development Program for Postgraduate students on 09.02.2021 on the topic “Gratitude in Action”. Character strengths play a major role in holistic growth and development of students. Hence Gratitude being one the important character strengths was considered for the session. Prof. Mamatha K, Asst. Professor, dept. of Psychology, Postgraduate Centre, SFS College handled the session. The session was arranged for the entire PG students. PG faculty also participated in the session. The session began at 12.00 p.m. Prof. Dakshina introduced the speaker to the participants. Prof. Mamatha started defining gratitude to the participants. 
7. Social Media: A boon or a bane for society and individuals

- While on the surface it appears social networking brings people together across the Internet, in a larger sense it may create social isolation.



- While many businesses use social networking sites to find and communicate with clients, the sites also prove a great distraction to employees who may show more interest in what their friends are posting than in their work tasks.




