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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

St. Francis de Sales College (SFS), located in Electronics City, Bengaluru, is one of the leading institutions of higher education in Karnataka. It is managed by the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS), who firmly believe that *“The education of the heart is the heart of education,”* as propounded by their Founder, Fr. Peter Mary Mermier.

Established in June 2004, St. Francis de Sales College is a minority institution with a secular policy, open to students from diverse backgrounds. The College is permanently affiliated to Bangalore University. It was granted “A” grade by the NAAC in 2015. The Postgraduate Centre was added to the College in 2017. In 2018, the College obtained 2(f) and 12(b) recognition under the UGC Act of 1965. AICTE approval was obtained in 2020 to begin regular MBA Program from 2020-21. The College is also an ISO 9001:2015 Certified Institution.

The College seeks to pursue excellence in teaching, learning, and research, efficiency in innovative scholarship and intellectual inquiry, and transformation of the world by the inculcation of moral values and a sense of community. Our goal is the integral formation of students who make a difference in the world by their commitment to nation building and global concerns. We cater to the educational needs of everyone, especially those from the disadvantaged backgrounds in the rural and farming community in the area. We place a special emphasis on supporting the first-generation graduates from this region.

Institutional Weakness

- Limited financial allocation for research in the past placed the College at a disadvantage in research and development.
- While gross enrollment has increased, the low enrollment in a few departments is a cause of concern.
- More solar-powered installations are required to rely on non-conventional energy resources.
- The academic constraints of not being an Autonomous College poses difficulties for students in terms of higher education and placements.

Institutional Opportunity

- There is a potential for introducing more professional courses such as MCA, MSW, AI related courses, and industry-integrated programs.
- With good infrastructure and scope for expansion, the College can obtain the autonomous status from UGC.
- The College can work towards developing it into a College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) and mobilizing the resources.
- The College can initiate the process to have a UGC Care Listed Journal.
- The College can explore possibilities of tie-ups with foreign universities for cultural immersion programs, joint conferences, research collaborations, etc.

Institutional Challenge

- The College faces challenges in mobilizing funds for research and development from external organizations.
- The low socio-economic situation of the majority of the students who are admitted to College (many being first generation graduates) poses a challenge, especially with regard to their language skills, level of understanding, and communication skills. This results in an unsatisfactory level of absorption, comprehension, and communication, especially in the first two semesters.
- To train future entrepreneurs and academic leaders, more research grants and business collaborations are required.
- The recent developments related to Artificial Intelligence pose challenges in the teaching-learning process.
- Students opting for Science and Arts courses are less and orienting them towards such courses from Class 12 is a major hurdle.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The Curriculum of St. Francis de Sales College encompasses the syllabus prescribed by Bangalore University, Add-on/Certificate Courses, Skill Development Courses, Bridge courses, and co-curricular and extracurricular activities to have a holistic development of the students. The institution has adopted the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP) that allows the students to have a wide variety of subjects to learn from.

The Academic Council of the institution takes the lead in designing the curriculum for the students. The Academic Council and IQAC approve the Certificate and Add-on courses and the calendar of events for each semester. Course plans are prepared by subject experts along with the Course outcomes to give students the mapping of the modules and their outcomes.

To bridge the gap between the academia and industry and make the students industry-ready and prepared for the rapidly changing world, Add-on Courses are offered by every department. 45 certificate courses were offered in the past five years and the institution makes it mandatory for the students to register for the Add-on Courses as part of their curriculum. The Add-on courses are offered in blended mode and that aids in having the flexibility to the learning pace of the students.

The PG students take up the MOOC courses as part of their curriculum and the UG students are also

encouraged to enroll in the courses and add credits to their degree. Cross-cutting issues like Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Community Empowerment, Environment, and Sustainability are integrated through the curricular and co-curricular activities. Life values are taught to students by integrating them with the lessons taught. Inter-disciplinary courses also allow the students to learn a wide range of values.

The feedback is sought from different stakeholders at the end of every year on the curriculum and the IQAC initiates the feedback. The feedback analysis is made and the analysis is discussed and presented in the Academic Council. The HODs of the departments plan the next academic year with the feedback provided and improve their curriculum with more experiential learning like industrial visits, projects, and field visits.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

St. Francis de Sales College leaves no stone unturned in providing an amiable atmosphere for the teaching and learning process of the students. Right from the admission procedure, the students are assisted and accompanied. A special counselling team is appointed during the admission process to guide the students toward selecting their programs.

The admission procedure is also a transparent one and the seats are allotted to the deserving candidates. Various Scholarships are provided for the economically weaker sections of the students. The students are oriented on various issues concerning their studies, jobs, personality development, capability enhancement, etc.

The teachers facilitate the students' learning by way of teaching, mentoring, evaluating, and supporting in all their endeavours. Every student is allotted a mentor to guide them and support them in each step of their college life. Learning through experience is given priority at the institution and the course plans are designed in such a way as to facilitate hands-on learning.

Every course has assignments, seminars, presentations, and activities like debates, group discussions, and so on. ICT tools are used by every faculty and students are encouraged to learn through apps and games.

Students undergo regular evaluative exam process and their performance is evaluated transparently. The slow learners are supported by giving special attention and participative learning is encouraged at every level of learning. The semester exam results are analyzed every semester and the analysis is used to study the pattern of learning of the students and the needed measures are taken to make the students perform better in the next exams. A grievance mechanism is in place to address the issues faced by the students related to exams.

Outcome Based Education has been adopted by the institution and the Programme outcomes and the Course outcomes are mapped at the beginning of each semester and the same is made available for the students. The process helps the faculty to stay focussed on the outputs and helps the students to understand the purpose of their study.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The Aspire – Entrepreneurship Cell of St. Francis de Sales College has taken a lot of initiatives to orient and encourage students to support their journey of becoming entrepreneurs. The institution has tie-ups with the Karnataka State Council for Science and Technology and conducts IPR programs under the guidance of the Council. We also have a Standard Club initiative by the Government of India to encourage students to use

standardized products. The institution is ranked with 2 stars from IIC and has been funded to conduct the Impact Lecture Series. An incubation center is set up in the institution and ideas have been generated through the center.

St. Francis de Sales College has a dedicated Research Cell that encourages faculty and students to take up research work. It ensures that any research activity undertaken by staff or students meets the highest standards. Many seminars, workshops, and webinars have been conducted to promote research culture in the institution. Incentives are provided to faculty for publishing research papers in UGC CARE-listed publications and in books and chapters.

Extension activities have been one of the key areas of importance in the institution as they pave the way to serve society. NCC and NSS play a key role in contributing to society and through DISHA – Desalite Initiative for Social and Holistic Action, all the students are encouraged to take up social service. Various cells and committees fall under the wider umbrella of DISHA and encourage students to participate in activities that help the neighbouring community.

The NSS has adopted villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and the College has been selected for funding under the scheme. The NCC unit has been appreciated and awarded for being the best team in the Karnataka and Goa province. The institution has received appreciation and recognition from various organisations for its commendable service to society.

MOUs are signed to support the students and give them exposure to research collaborations, internships, and student and faculty exchange. Collaboration with industries is also made to give training to students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

St. Francis de Sales Colleges has consistently adopted a proactive policy in providing the best physical facilities and an environment conducive to the academic and overall development of students. The College campus is spread over a spacious stretch of land with lush greenery and State-of-the-art infrastructure and modern facilities making the learning process a delightful experience. The College has ICT-enabled classrooms, well-equipped laboratories, computer labs, wifi access, and air-conditioned seminar rooms and auditoriums. The campus is user-friendly to physically challenged and differently abled persons with wheelchair accessibility and elevators that facilitate movements to all the floors.

The Institute has an excellent library with a vast collection of printed books and journals as well as e-journals. The INLIBNET, NPTEL, and DELNET databases and the digital library provide the students and staff with additional tools necessary for their intellectual growth, critical inquiry, and a profound appreciation for lifelong learning. Best library user awards are provided to students and staff to encourage the usage of the library.

The College has multiple playgrounds for sports activities like Basketball, Baseball, Volleyball, Football, and Cricket, and a fully furnished gym and fitness center to support the physical wellness of the students and staff. Facilities are also provided for the indoor games. We have a serene yoga centre for meditation and prayer.

The campus is Wi-Fi enabled and has integrated software for all its administrative and academic activities. The institution has a vast IT infrastructure with state-of-the-art laboratories. The labs are equipped with the latest software and instruments for the use of the students. All the computers are provided with the latest updated software and hardware. Internet, printing, and scanning facilities are also available. Further, each center is

equipped with uninterrupted power backup.

The teaching of information technology and computer-based papers is carried out through OHP screens in the computer centers. In addition, the centers are also available for the students to access the internet, practice, and for preparation of their projects. Optimal deployment of IT infrastructure is ensured through conducting workshops, awareness programs, and training programs for faculty on the use of new technology.

Student Support and Progression

The College is committed to excellence in all spheres, and therefore, every student who joins the college is extended academic, psychological, professional, and financial assistance to make his/her stay in the College an enriching experience. The College provides a meaningful partnership between students and teachers. This is seen in the planning of all academic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities.

Students with financial constraints are offered a wide variety of support with scholarships and freeships. Every year, based on the needs of the students, new scholarships are made available for the needy students. Orientations are given to students on both government and institutional scholarships to make them aware of the facilities. The scholarship cell supports the needy students by facilitating various scholarships.

Capacity-building programs are offered to all the students to train them to have life skills. Various In-Bound and Out-Bound Trainings are organized for students to facilitate self-awareness, emotional and physical health, leadership skills, team work, etc.

There is a dedicated placement cell that facilitates internships and placement to the students. The placement and career counselling cell organizes career-oriented programs and promotions for the benefit of the students. Placement drives are conducted on the campus and students attend off-campus interviews as well.

Orientation programs on higher education opportunities are provided to the students and they are encouraged to pursue their higher studies.

The College has an infirmary, a full-time nurse, and a counsellor to address and support the physical and mental health needs of the student community. A language lab is available for developing the communication skills of the students. Courses are conducted to help the students for various competitive examinations.

Various statutory cells like the ICC, Grievance Redressal, OBC, SC/ST and Anti-Ragging committees, etc. have been constituted to address the different concerns of students. These committees serve the purpose of supporting the student community and providing assistance in times of crisis. The students are encouraged to actively participate in various state, national, and international cultural competitions and sports tournaments, and they have brought laurels to the institution. The alumni network is strong and supports the institution in various capacities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College has an ERP - Linways Technology, which helps the institution with automating the different modules of functionalities. The institution has various welfare measures for the staff of the institution and supports them in every way possible to create a conducive environment for the teaching-learning process. The faculty are encouraged to participate in different enrichment programs and various in-bound and out-bound trainings are organized to enhance their knowledge and teaching skills. The performance appraisal helps in understanding the strengths and weaknesses of the staff, which in turn will help in the development of the staff as well as the students.

The IQAC as the heart of the institution takes up various initiatives to plan, execute, and achieve the institutional excellence. The IQAC conducts internal and external academic audits to have a transparent functioning of the institution and ensure the overall quality. The institution also tries to find funding for its development and adequately plans its budget for the optimal utilization of the resources.

E-waste and hazardous waste are given to vendors for recycling and proper disposal.

For differently-abled students, the institution provides all possible facilities such as adequate infrastructure, moral support, and software facilities supporting the learning process. SFS College has a well-defined code of ethics for students, faculty, and stakeholders and it is published on the College website. A well-formed committee monitors the discipline in the College. The College holds its reputation for moulding

students as global citizens. The education policies of the College ensure inclusive education for the rural, urban, and global communities. The institution celebrates national and international festivals throughout the year to create awareness and capture the essence of the nation and the world.

Service to humanity is ensured by conducting many extension and outreach programs under the banner of DISHA. A comprehensive development of the students is achieved through Wednesday seminars (MindCraft) which help them develop their knowledge and social skills.

These exams are conducted strictly in conformity with the University pattern (question papers, seating arrangements, timetables, etc.). Valued answer scripts are made available within a week of internal exams and marks are entered into the ERP - Linways Technology - for student access. The office promptly addresses any student grievances related to examinations. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The system at SFS College, Bangalore is meticulously designed to guarantee fairness and transparency in the assessment process, with a streamlined, time-bound, and efficient grievance redressal mechanism. The Office of Examination oversees the efficient conduct of the internal and University examinations at the College.

Examination Governance: The Principal acts as the Chief Superintendent of Examinations, with the Vice-Principal as the Deputy Superintendent. A faculty member serves as the Controller of Examinations, along with the Assistant Controller, supported by Exam Cell Members, Office Staff, and Advisory Members.

Internal Assessment - Mechanism: The Office takes care of all pre-examination logistics, including preparation of question papers, room arrangements, invigilation, and distribution, ensuring a smooth and secure examination process with zero tolerance for malpractice. After the internal exams, the Office ensures the timely return of valued answer scripts to students within a week, with marks entered into the ERP – Linways Technology portal for student access.

The scheduled dates of the CIA including Exams are announced in the College calendar. A candidate should have a minimum of 85% attendance in all the subjects to be permitted for the internal exams. Information about the performance of the Internal Exams is made available to the parents through the ERP of the College. Sammilana, the Parent-Teachers' Meet is organized within two weeks of the completion of the exams.

Following the guidelines outlined in the NEP by Bangalore University, 40% of the marks are designated for internal assessment. Internal assessment marks are derived from assignments, seminars, the internal examination, model examination, seminars, assignments, quizzes, case studies, and attendance.

Internal Assessment - Grievance Redressal: The concerned faculty resolves grievances related to the internal assessment examinations per the Exam Cell norms. For any further escalation, the student approaches the Office of Exam, by filing a formal grievance form (made available in the Office and on the College website). The grievance is settled, with transparency, in a week.

External Assessment (End Sem University Exam) - Mechanism: Bangalore University holds examinations at the end of each semester. For a pass in the University Semester Examinations, a student is required to score a minimum of 40%. A candidate should have a minimum 75% attendance per semester, in each paper to be permitted to take the end-semester examinations. Students are notified of the exam dates as soon as it is available on the Bangalore University portal. Students have to register and enroll in the University portal. Class coordinators obtain the hall tickets from the Office of Exam and distribute them to the eligible students.

External Assessment (End Sem University Exam) - Grievance Redressal: Students should file a formal grievance to the University Liaison Officer in the Office of Examinations for any complaints regarding the University exams - including results, mark cards, and certificates. The Office files the complaint with the relevant supporting documents to the University. The liaison officer monitors the issue, updates the student on its status, and resolves it within the allotted time frame (as per University norms).

The institution encompasses the desired knowledge and skill outputs that are determined through an analysis of the industry's demands and the student profile while adhering to Bangalore University's specified curriculum. A consideration of the institutional vision and goal is also included when identifying and stating the intended learning outcomes.

For the programs that are carried out, each Department develops Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and course Outcomes (COs), which outline what each student should know at the end of the course, and are developed by the faculty to establish clear academic goals that are consistent with the institutional vision and mission. Furthermore, the organization makes certain that the attainment requirements and delivery strategies are appropriate and successful.

- At the start of each semester, department meetings with the principal and IQAC are arranged to go over the lesson plans and objectives for each course.
- Every semester, faculty meetings are held to have a thorough discussion of the POs, PSOs, and COs.
- POs, PSOs, and COs are also available for viewing by all stakeholders on the college website.
- Every semester, after the department meetings, reviews are conducted to evaluate the POs, PSOs, and COs.
- Numerous academic staff members take part in the university-organized workshops on curriculum modification.
- Many faculty participate as members of the Board of Studies (BOS) and Board of Examination (BOE) at the University level thus contributing to discussions on programmes and course outcomes.

For Continuous Internal Assessment, each faculty member creates questions that are in line with the COs of that specific subject (CIA). COs and Bloom levels are assigned for all the questions of the Internal components.

Faculty Members define the assessment methodologies and map them to course outcomes and Bloom's Taxonomy. Internal Assessments include the First Internal Exams, Model Exams, Assignments, field visits, Case Studies, Quizzes, and Seminars for every semester.

The progressive curriculum proposed shall position knowledge and skills required on the continuum of novice problem solvers (at the entry level of the programme) to expert problem solvers (by the time of graduation)

- At the end of every semester – COs are attained
- At the end of the final year – POs are attained

The marks of the internal assessment are entered in the ERP which calculates the CO and PO attainment based on Bloom's Taxonomy and Attainment rule. This facilitates the faculty's ability to provide corrective actions as needed. Every subject's CO and PO matrix is created by the relevant faculty, and it advances to the master CO-PO matrix of the department and the institution.

The targets for the CO will be set by the Subject Matter Expert at the beginning of the year. At the end of every semester, CO attainment scores will be checked with the target set at the beginning. If the target is not met, the areas that require improvement will be found and measures will be taken to fill the gap. If the target is met, a new target will be set to improve the standards. The following are the steps to measure the CO attainment score:

- Semester End Examination (SEE) is conducted and evaluated by the University. The exam will be conducted for 70/60 marks (CBCS/NEP) and these marks will be taken as it is. The marks are equally distributed to all the COS.
- Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIA) is done by the Department. Marks for CIA will be 30/40 for (CBCS/NEP). CIA marks are calculated based on scores from Assignments, Attendance, Seminars, First Internal Examinations, Quizzes, Community projects, Case studies, and Model

Examinations.

The initial target will be set by the course instructor based on the complexities and expectations of the course. To complete the CO attainment, the CIA and SEE components are combined. The gaps are analyzed and corrective measures are taken through analyzing case studies, problem-solving questions, real-world projects, and conducting additional courses to bridge the gap.

The OBE Cell regularly monitors the attainment level for every course. In case the attainment level of any course is below the threshold level, then additional measures such as remedial classes, tutorial classes, additional assignments, counselling, etc. are conducted.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Optimal Utilization of Funds

The internal audit is done in March every year. The Administrator along with his finance team conducts the internal audit. The institution submits all the records of the expenditure and income including invoices, vouchers, bank transfer details, salary details of the staff, policy documents, MoUs, etc., for their reference. The administrator collects all the details and carries out complete scrutiny of all the documents submitted and the same is later given to a professional auditing firm to prepare the balance sheets. Internal auditing does not only look into the financial affairs of the institution but also examines the complete functioning of the institution. The administrator and his team make observations on the financial affairs of the institution which help them to plan and approve the budgeting of the institution.
