Nomen constitute nearly half of the total population, the economic emancipation of this socially nomically vulnerable section leaves a lot to be desired. The female population in India is 48.17% ted by the World Bank in 2015. According to the Sixth Economic Census by the National Survey Organisation (NSSO), only 14% of business establishments in the country are being run le entrepreneurs. This means that out of the 58.5 million functional businesses, only 8.05 million have females as boss. Among the states, the largest number of establishments under women neurship is in Tamilnadu (13.51%) followed by Kerala (11.35%).

order to safeguard and enhance the women entrepreneurs of the nation, various institutional tions like nationalized banks, state financial and industrial corporations, etc., have been given isks and schemes at central and state levels. However, there has been a strong feeling among the ights group and other pressure groups that there has been a Luke-warm response from banks to financial practices meant for women entrepreneurs. The financial services offered by the sector have not been extended to cover the large section of the women population engaged in eurial activities. The women entrepreneurs in semi-urban and rural areas of the country are ected as far as the inclusive banking practices are concerned. By and large, the women eurs of these areas are serviced predominantly by informal financial institutions.
